General Synod 2017

Our church is currently proud to nurture two Members-in-Discernment, Grant Helbley and Michael Overman, as they journey through the process of discerning a call to ordained ministry. Michael and Grant attended the national United Church of Christ gathering (General Synod) in Baltimore this summer, with generous financial support from our church and the Central Pacific Conference. Read on to hear more about the General Synod experience, as reported by Grant Helbley.

General Synod 2017 in Baltimore was 5 days of stories, prayers, playfulness, and serious business. There were over 3000 people present. 20 resolutions were considered and discussed over the course of 8 plenary meetings, each of them 3 hours long and governed by the strict boundaries of Robert's Rules. Topics included racial justice, disability justice, environmental justice, financial responsibility, and difficult questions of how to think ethically about complex issues like the discipline of children and medically assisted suicide. I watched my new community love and affirm one another,



disagree, have difficult conversations with one another, and practice covenant and hospitality together. I even had lunch with the paradoxically named Welcoming and Faithful group whose primary concern is that as the church becomes more welcoming to those on the margins it is no longer comfortable for ECOT (Evangelical, Conservative, Orthodox, and Traditional) believers. They are on a different place in their journey than I am but I recognize the landscape.



Some of the highlights of synod for me was singing with other attendees and delegates in worship, attending a march for immigrant justice led by the family of Guillermo Recinos Morales who has been detained by ICE for 3 months, hearing Rev Naomi Washington-Leapheart preach at the ONA banquet, meeting our new Conference Minister Rev Molly Carlson, and leading a roundtable discussion on gender in the exhibit hall.

I had gone with one burning question, "I know that I love my home church, but will I find that there is a place for me in the larger UCC community? Will they like me? Will I like them? I found my answer in my history and polity class while tracing the roots of incredible theological diversity that nourish the present expressions of the church. In the history of the Christian Connexion I found shared theological origins with the Adventist community that raised me. I found my answer in affirming conversations with leaders in various settings of the church who recognized my own minority identities as an asset and gift for the church rather than a liability. I found my answer in the deep and beautiful heart connections I made with other clergy and members in discernment. The

answer was a clear and strong yes. The United Church of Christ is full of my people. I like them. They like me. It's where I belong.

I love this community. I am proud of what this community is doing, and we can do better. One thing I could not have anticipated coming from my Oregon bubble was how white, politically engaged, East Coast, and proud of their liberal theology the UCC is. If this church was formed by 4 streams, it is the Congregationalist stream descended from the Pilgrims and Puritans that dominated the culture of the 2017 General Synod. There was a strong sense of optimism among the assembled delegates that by passing resolutions of witness on issues of social justice and communicating those resolutions to politicians and church members, we are capable of creating the kingdom of God on earth. I couldn't help reflecting on how many of the significant resolutions of the church both present and historical have only been necessary as a result of colonialist ideas and purity laws brought by our spiritual ancestors with the conviction that they could create the kingdom of God on earth. Given this sobering history, I would have liked to have heard more repentance and less self-congratulation from speakers and delegates. The work of social justice is not a brave new venture. There have always been people on the margins calling for justice. We have not invented a new thing, we have begun to learn how to listen. Listening requires from the church a humble acknowledgement that people with good intentions can still do great harm, and that we are doing nothing more than what is our responsibility when we do the hard work of making right the sins of our fathers.

The theme of the Faithful and Welcoming lunch I attended was "Putting Christ in the Center of the Church." While I'm sure our reasons are very different this is one place where I can agree with the ECOT's. At a time when the word Christian is associated with being anti-gay, politically conservative, patriarchal, racist, and nationalist, I am proud to be part of a community of faith that speaks as a Christian witness for the poor and marginalized. I am proud to be part of the Christian counter argument when the loud minority insists that God hates. I know of no bolder anti-colonialist,



communist, economic justice, and feminist preacher and activist than Jesus. More now than ever, we need the witness of the historical Jesus speaking truth to power in our churches.

My final conclusion is that the United Church of Christ is a vibrant, healthy, diverse group of people who are seeking to live the commandment of Jesus to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind, and love your neighbor as yourself." We are a people from different racial and ethnic identities, different theological backgrounds, and different socioeconomic locations, with differing abilities and disabilities, and with differing gender expressions and sexualities. Yet we make the radical claim to share a common identity in Christ. We have come a long way and there is still a lot of work to be done. While it is tempting to try to define our identity by the least common denominator, it is in fact the particularities of our differences that make us strong. This great experiment of unity has had some very rocky moments in the history of the UCC but if General Synod is a faithful reflection of the state of the larger church, faith in the power of covenantal unity is still alive. We do not persist despite each other, we need each other. The kingdom of God is not a thing we create, it is a thing we become when we are all together.

Moderator Note

Dear Friends,

I hope you are all feeling blessed! This summer has been very beautiful. As you plan your summer trips, don't forget to stay cool and hydrated. We've had

some exciting items take place in church this past months. Below are the items and updates on various activities.

CHURCH LIFE UPDATES:

- On July 3rd, 2017, Council approved the appointment of Alison Killeen to the Budget Development Committee. Alison was appointed to the Member-At-Large position of the Committee.
- Our Church's Budget Development Committee has started its work on our 2018 Church Budget.
 The committee will give regular updates to Council on their progress from now until November
 2017. In November, Church Council will be voting on either approval or disapproval of the 2018
 Church Budget.
- The Safety Team provided an update on their progress on our Church's Emergency Response Plan. The team also provided an update on the creation of the Point of Contact church member designation. We have about 15 church members who are designated Point of Contacts in emergency situations. These members will aid our church members in properly following the correct steps in response to a church emergency of any type. These members will also be trained in various emergency response subjects.
- Our Community Core Ministry Facilitator, Grant Helbley, provided an update on one of the projects they have been working on. The scope of the project is to provide an online resource where church members can post about ways that we can support each other. For example, offering of rides, meal trains, and just wanting to have some company can be posted to the online resource. Church members will then be able to fill those needs.

CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATES:

• We affirmed the creation of a new Congregation Care group. The group will be put together to help support our Ministers with care of congregation members. The group will help with items such as, church member house visits, travel to church members in needed of support, etc. Church Council already thinks there are church members who are already doing some form of Congregation Care. With this group creation, we are hoping to have a defined team that the Ministers can call on for support of this kind.



- We affirmed the hiring of retired Minister, Hector Lopez to be an assistant to Elizabeth Durant, as Elizabeth becomes our Senior Minister, during Michael's Paternity leave. Michael's Paternity Leave will be from Mid-August to Mid-October. Hector has worked with our congregation in many ways before and we are excited to share this new connection with him. There will be plenty of opportunities for us all to have one on ones with Hector in the coming future.
- Our visioning portion of Council this month focused on determining the best ways to make sure
 that we have church participation through volunteering. We at Church Council understand the
 importance of our Church members who volunteer to fill roles on their spare time and who support
 our community. We want to keep our church volunteering up and we want to make sure we support
 our church volunteers as they support us.
- We shared our ideas on what we think the frame work of the Church's Fundraisings Committee should be. We talked about the ways that the newly developing committee can provide for our church. We also highlighted any draw backs that we saw in relation to the Committee. We hope to have the newly forming committee functioning on church projects late October of this year.
- We also talked about our thoughts on the presence of many individuals that have been using the front of our church porch as a place of dwelling during most morning and afternoons on weekdays and weekends. Church Council, Church Ministers and Church Staff are aware of the issues that the front porch dwellers have been causing. While keeping in mind the safety of all the people in our community and the different perspectives that our church community members have on the dwellers, we (Council, ministers and staff) have good ideas on how to move forward in making the number of dwellers in our Church front porch more manageable. We hope with the good ideas being implemented we will provide a safer interaction with the dwellers and our church. We are also asking that during this time our church members be patient with us on this topic. Please also let our church Facilities Manager, Steve Eggers, our Church Ministers, our Church Business Manager, Cara Roth and I know of any uncomfortable situations that you may have experienced on the front church porch. All of our contact information is listed on the back of your Sunday Bulletin.
