Hi church family,

As the nights grow longer and we feel the change of seasons in the air, we look ahead toward the holidays with anticipation. All of our cherished First Congregational traditions, along with new friends (and new babies!) to celebrate them with, are waiting for us.

Yet while the change to cooler weather is a welcome one, other changes in our world are not. In the past two months, we have watched in horror as wildfires, hurricanes

and earthquakes have claimed lives and destroyed so much of the natural beauty we cherish. As we pray for the recovery of our beloved Gorge, we also pray—hard—for the rebuilding of Puerto Rico, Mexico, Florida, Houston. We continue to seek ways to address climate change and its effects on our planet, as well as the systems of oppression that keep nations and states in poverty.

Even as we lament these natural disasters, our hearts are heavy with news of the mass shooting in Las Vegas. We feel a too-familiar fury at the lack of compassionate, meaningful response from our elected leaders. We mourn both the deaths from gun violence and the political divides that prevent us from enacting solutions.

On Sunday, October 8, we wrote letters to our Congressional representatives and engaged with "prayer-in-action" stations in different corners of the sanctuary as a way to shift some of our anger and grief toward positive action. We know that we must continue to sustain our hope and work for the future we imagine. The interfaith fourth Sunday "Beloved Community forums" are an ongoing opportunity for us to engage in this work. I'm so grateful for the leadership of our Rev. Michael Ellick and Rev. Hector Lopez as they extend the reach of friendship in our city.

It has been my pleasure to serve as your acting Senior Minister these past 10 weeks. Thank you for your support, caring, and encouragement during this time. With much joy, we welcomed Rev. Michael back on October 15, to lead us in a new sermon series on the Gospel of John. We are also entering our stewardship season, so watch your mailbox for more information about the exciting ways we plan to celebrate that "We Are Generous!"

May the Holy One increase our imagination and sustain our courage as we seek to bring healing change to our world. May the peace of Christ surround and fill you, now and always!

Dear Friends,

My Moderator Note begins with a question: How many people took the time at 10:18am, Monday, August 21, to see the solar eclipse instantly turn our sunny day into night?

I sure did! In fact, I'm one of the crazy people who joined the

thousands near Bend, Oregon to see the eclipse in the line of totality. If you didn't take the time to see it, your next chance to see a total eclipse in Oregon will be 70 years from now. I'm sure we will all be here in 70 years from now to see it too. Even though the traffic was extensive, I would not have traded the experience for anything.

Secondly, my heart for the past couple of weeks has been going out to members of our congregation that have been affected by the Eagle Creek fires. I have had conversations with affected congregation members and have spent some time reassuring them that our church community is here to provide them with assistance and support. My prayers have also gone out to Mother Nature's healing. I pray that all the lands burned by fires this year will, in due time, heal and spring forth with new growth and life.

As I organize my outdoor fall and winter sports trips in Oregon, I plan to witness, first hand, how these fires have changed our lands. I also plan to take some time to reflect on this thought: when our earth hurts, we hurt as well, and when our earth heals, we heal as well.

We've had some exciting and sad events take place in

church these past months. Below are the church Life and Church Council updates that I have to share.

Church Life Updates:

- Our church camera, which will be primarily used for Sunday sermon recording, has arrived and is available for church community members who would like to help with recording our Sunday sermons. The camera comes with instructions and is very user-friendly. Video recording of Sunday sermons will now be done from the balcony floor of our sanctuary. - Our next Oliver Lecture event will take place
 October 29 at 3:00 at the church. The speaker
 is Khalil Bendib, world-renowned political
 cartoonist whose work is now on exhibition in
 our gallery. This is an event not-to-be missed—
 look for further information in this *Pilgrim*.
 Thank you, Sheldon Hurst, for taking your time
 to provide this connection for our church and
 community.
- Because the number of people staying on our front porch has risen to an unmanageable number (and because of limited staff availability), we have, for an extended period of time, decided to suspend the practice of allowing people to sleep there.
- On Saturday, Sept 9, in our church classroom, I attended "I Love You, So Make Me Happy: Insecurities, God, and How Non-Monogamy Changed My Life." The Storylab was led by our Community Core Ministry Facilitator, Grant Helbley. In the lab, I got to hear the stories of a few folks in our Congregation. I shared my story as well. The biggest take away, for me, was that we all have in us immense amounts of love that

can be shared over and over again. Sharing your love with one person doesn't mean that you don't have enough love to share with others. Thank you, Grant, for opening yourself to our Congregation in such a meaningful way.

- On Sunday, Sept 10, in our church fellowship hall, I attended a presentation given by our church's investment company, United Church Funds. The presentation was on sustainably responsible investing. I learned all the methods United Church Funds has taken to ensure our church investments are used to provide support for companies who are morally sound, who care for the environment, and who do their best to keep human rights at the forefront.
- On Sunday, Sept 10, in our church sanctuary, I attended Bob Larsen's funeral. Given that I was a newcomer to our church after Bob had been home ridden, I had not had the opportunity to meet him in person. I did, however, feel the effects of Bob's work in relation to this church. At the funeral, I got to meet Bob's family and let them know how thankful our church community is to have had Bob in our presence. I also let them know how often we give church newcomers Bob's book, The Church with the Tower. The book is a great source and archive of our church history and is a testimony of the love our past Church Historian, Bob Larsen, had for this church.

Church Council Updates:

- We approved the appointment of Hector Lopez, Lesley Sepetoski, and Paris Hancock to the Stewardship Captains team for 2017. Hector will lead the team this year. The Stewardship Captain team will coordinate all of the efforts of the fall 2017 pledge drive. The work of the captains will be from early October to mid-November.
- We approved the partnership between our church and the organization *Street Roots*. First

- Congregational Church is now one of the many churches that are a part of the *Street Roots*Community of Faith Partnership. Our church will be working with a *Street Roots* vendor each Sunday. When you see the vendor at our church, introduce yourself and get to know them. They are, like you, a part of our community.
- We took in another wonderful visioning session during our August 2017 Council Meeting. Our main questions during this session were, how do we at First Congregational Church retain our church volunteers, and how do we continually acknowledge the work that our church volunteers perform? We gave answers such as having a quarterly volunteer recognition hospitality hour celebration, having a volunteer spotlight e-mail blast, and having a volunteer recognition points system which will allow for redemption of free, church-themed apparel and items.
- We approved the appointment of Alice Forsythe, Patty Bonney, Amanda Guthrie, Alison Killeen, and Bruce Bishop as First Congregational delegates to the Central Pacific Conference.
- We are getting closer to the final approval of our church's Open and Safe Emergency Response Plan. We plan to approve the response plan by mid-October, 2017.
- Helbley for ordination, pending call to the Central Pacific Conference Committee on Ministry. Grant is currently our Community Core Ministry Facilitator and one of our church's members in discernment. With the recommendation, Grant will now be one step closer to being able to officially receive a call to ministry from congregations under the United Church of Christ umbrella. Congratulations Grant!
- We finalized Church Council's visioning retreat.
 Instead of our normal October 2017 council

meeting, council will have a 2-hour vision retreat in October. The topic of the visioning will be on how our church community builds community internally. The topic of the retreat is a rich one and we are looking forward to diving into the aspects of this topic with our ministers and Core Ministry Facilitator team.

- We approved revisions to our church's Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual and to our Sunday Offering Counting Policy and Procedure.
- We started our work on creating what our church's evaluation method will be for our Senior Minister and for our church ministry. As we develop these methods, we hope the results will give us a full view of how our congregation and ministry are doing.

In closing, I wish all good things to you and your loved ones as we move into fall.



Welcome Reverend Amanda Guthrie!

Our Church Council was pleased to review and approve a covenant between First Congregational and Rev. Amanda Guthrie this year. This covenant is an agreement between Rev. Guthrie, our church, the Central Pacific Conference of the United Church of Christ, and Providence Portland Medical Center, where Rev. Guthrie works as a Clinical Chaplain.

You might recognize Rev. Amanda from the times she has led worship and worked with our children. She is an active member of our Family Ministries team and regularly participates in our church life. While her primary work location is Providence Portland, as part of her four-way covenant with our church, Rev. Guthrie will preach once a year and share updates about her work as a chaplain in our newsletter.

Rev. Amanda writes:

"I grew up in West Chester, PA and attended a house church of about 12 people who sang, prayed, and ate together every week. I studied math and public policy in college, thinking that I would become a teacher who knew a little something about education policy. But, my sophomore year, I felt strongly that God was calling me to talk to people about God. I listened to that, and I went on to pursue a Master of Divinity & Master of Public Policy at the University of Chicago. Gradually, my call became clearer. After grad school, I worked at a church that had a relationship with a small community hospital on the south side of Chicago. I did some training at that hospital and went on to volunteer there.

When my partner was called to serve a Disciples of Christ church in Portland, I took the opportunity to apply to chaplaincy residency programs in the city. I was fortunate to do my training and then be asked to stay on as a Clinical Chaplain at Providence Portland Medical Center.

At Providence, I work primarily with adults with mental illness. I love so much about my work, including that the patients I meet are asking what I call "the big questions" about life's meaning and God's role in their lives and in the world. I love most working with patients in group settings, because it's in those conversations that everyone has a chance to learn from one another and to have their own wisdom affirmed. I currently lead four group conversations about spirituality each week, and I have just begun to host a kind of interfaith worship service called "Connecting with the Sacred" once a week.

My work is incredibly rewarding but also quite challenging. I am grateful to be a member of First Congregational, where I feel so supported and cared for by the pastors and by the community. I feel that there are so many opportunities to be fed and filled by the Spirit at First, which is exactly what I need so that I can continue to share that Spirit with all those I encounter. I look forward to growing in faith and in community with all of you. I love most talking about "the big stuff," which is why I so enjoy working with children and youth whose questions and observations are so profound. I hope that you and I can engage in this kind of conversation, too!"

Please extend a warm welcome and offer your encouragement, gratitude and support to Rev. Guthrie as she continues her ministry of care and compassion. Welcome Rev. Amanda Guthrie!






OLIVER LECTURE
