"JOURNEY TO EASTER" BY REV. DR. JANET PARKER

"The death of Jesus is for us nothing if we have not died with him; the resurrection of our Lord is for us nothing if we have not been raised with him." ~Emil Brunner

This year, our Lenten journey has woven through a Dark Wood. Our worship services and sermon themes



have centered around insights provided by Rev. Eric Elnes' book, *The Gifts of the Dark Wood: Seven Blessings for Soulful Skeptics (and Other Wanderers)*. We have faced temptation along with Jesus in the wilderness, confronted the void of self-hatred, found faith in our doubts, and seen our life's purpose illuminated in

flashes of lightning during the darkest storm. Within these experiences, we have found hidden gifts, and an Unexpected Love that never leaves us.

The path through the Dark Wood is the same path that Jesus walked 2,000 years ago. I know this because I know that God took on human life in order to know the full range of human experience. Each Lent and Holy Week, we have the opportunity to see in the life, passion and death of Jesus the extreme length God

went to enter into a solidarity of suffering love with humanity. And each Lent and Holy Week, we are invited to enter into solidarity with Jesus, and even, in a mysterious way, to enter into his death. For the testimony of 2,000 years of Christian proclamation is that the path leading to a transformed and abundant life, a life of freedom in Beloved Community, passes through the narrow door of the cross. In other words, only those who have walked awhile in the Dark Wood with Jesus find their way into the light of an Easter sunrise.

Congregations also experience sojourns in the Dark Wood. Communities also know times when the cross seems omnipresent and resurrection a distant, if not empty, promise. Interim periods in the life of a church can be a Dark Wood experience. Loss and grief, "little deaths," may pile up, leading to discouragement and depressing the energy and spirit of the congregation. At First Congregational UCC, the losses in the past year have been substantial. Both pastors and subsequently other staff have departed. Plans have been disrupted and shelved. Programs and initiatives have fallen into disarray. Even some relationships have been strained due to the stress placed on the system by all these changes. These losses and strains are real and need to be named. Only that which is recognized and named can be healed. Lent has provided us the time

to slow down and acknowledge that the journey to new life, the path to transformation and the realization of the Beloved Community takes time.

Our Call to Worship during Lent has included the words: "There's a path... though it winds its way through darkness. We would choose to avoid it if we could." The truth is that none of us can avoid this path; the good news is that Jesus walks it with us. What is true for individuals is also true for congregations. Unexpected gifts await us in the Dark Wood. An Unexpected Love finds us at just the right time. The God who accompanies us into the darkness also lights our way out.

So here's the good news: unexpected gifts await those who stay on the path, who stay awake and keep vigil with Jesus in the darkest hours. For those who die with Jesus (and Jesus' community) will surely also rise with him. That is God's promise to us, a promise kept on Easter Sunday. Friends, believe the good news. Christ is risen! And with Christ, we also shall rise.

KEY MINISTRY INITIATIVES FOR 2019

At our March Council meeting, Council adopted three key ministry initiatives to help provide focus and energy for our congregation's ministry in 2019. These initiatives are tied to our three core ministry areas. These initiatives arose organically out of the interests, passions, and values that the congregation is already demonstrating, particularly when it comes to the key ministry initiatives for Hospitality and Peacemaking. The key ministry initiative for Community is particularly geared toward aiding the transition work of the congregation in 2019.

The overarching focus of the congregation during 2019 will be HEALTHY TRANSITION. As a reminder, the three overarching questions for the congregation during an interim period are:

Who are we?
Who are our neighbors?
What is God calling us to be and do?

These key ministry initiatives will help us answer these critical questions. They will not replace the existing work of the three core ministry areas but provide focal points for this year's efforts in our core ministry areas. The key initiatives are:

COMMUNITY

Renewing the Ties that Bind: Deepening relationships, building trust, discovering our shared purpose in mission to God's beloved community.

HOSPITALITY

Becoming an Artful Congregation: The Arts in service of community, spiritual formation, and interfaith collaboration.

PEACEMAKING

Becoming an Immigrant Welcoming Congregation: Following Jesus' call to radical hospitality, solidarity and service to our migrant neighbors.

MODERATOR MOMENT

Greetings from your 2019 Church Council and Moderator,

As I consider where to start with this piece, it occurs to me to look back at where we have been. A year ago, your Council/Moderator reported the beginnings of a process of Strategic Visioning for our congregation. We were planning to begin with developing a common church vision to include: who we are now, who we want to be and what we want to live into. From this we would develop a shared church vision and Behavioral Covenant.

First Congregational experienced some significant losses and barriers to making progress in this work last year. An initial team did meet and prepare a proposal for a Visioning Process. This did not proceed as Reverend Michael resigned shortly afterward. We have now said goodbye to two ministers, hired an Interim Minister and have a new impetus for developing a Behavioral Covenant and vision for moving forward well.

So moving now into 2019, we have begun the process of naming a Transition team to help guide us through this strategic visioning and prepare us for a Pastoral search.

Interim Process:

We have contracted with a Consultant from Center for Progressive Renewal to assist us with this process of developing our potential and understanding our strengths and weaknesses. Her name is Cameron Trimble. Here is a snippet from their website to help illuminate why we chose to work with CPR:

WE BELIEVE...

We believe that every leader and every congregation has untapped potential and is capable of making a meaningful impact in their community. Our work together realizes and amplifies the potential within the leaders of your congregation to envision a new future for your church. We believe that...

- Leadership is an art form, unique to every leader. When people, lay and ordained, are invited to contribute their energy to a congregation and see that the contribution makes a difference, the congregation is strengthened.
- Congregations are best thought of as "schools of love" where people gain access to relationships and resources that connect them to God and one another. That connection, over time, shapes them into more loving people.
- Some congregations need to close. Some congregations need to reinvent themselves. Some congregations need to amplify their vision and expand their impact. All congregations have potential.

To this end, Janet and Cameron have already begun working together and planning this work. First steps will involve the Vitality Assessment. This assessment draws from a survey of our congregation, church statistical

history and a review of ministry area demographics (from Missioninsite demographic tools). From this, CPR will develop a written report with recommendations.

This consultation contract includes a 3-day site visit. We have scheduled with Cameron to be in Portland, at First Congregational UCC, the weekend of May 3,4,5. She will be meeting with staff persons on Friday and dinner with Council on Friday evening. She will tour the community and church and meet with 20 members of our congregation on Saturday, May 4. On Sunday, May 5, she will attend our church service and hold a forum with the congregation before the service to discuss the ideas from her new book, Piloting Church. This sets out her philosophy and approach to working with churches. Following worship, she will be available for a general Q&A session with the congregation about the consulting work that she and the Center for Progressive Renewal are doing with our church.

Lastly, our contract with CPR will provide for 12 consultation and coaching sessions. These will take the form of monthly meetings via remote/video/phone. These are designed to assist with:

- Coaching our renewal team on presenting the change proposals to the congregation
- Developing an integration and implementation strategy for the congregation's strategic plan
- Developing a budget of both income and expenses for the plan
- Keeping our team on task and on time
- Working with us to overcome obstacles and resistance to change in the congregation

We need all of our congregants to engage in this process in order for the outcome to fully represent our strengths and our struggles, our passions, and our blind spots and to accurately guide our next steps and future of our church lives together.

Please consider the nomination of yourselves or others for the Transition Team. The deadline for submitting names is April 14. You may submit names to either me or Rev. Janet. And please attend to completing the Survey when this arrives in your inbox. We hope that all of you will be available on Sunday, May 5, to meet and listen to Cameron's presentation.

TREASURER'S REPORT



During our Annual Meeting in January we heard your request to provide updates on the financial health of our Church in 2019. Our plan is twofold – to provide monthly financial insights and to create a yearly Stewardship theme to enlighten and inform the good works behind your Pledge dollars. We have just wrapped up the first Quarter of 2019 and thus far what we have received in Pledges versus the Commitment from our congregants is much lower than in prior years. Just as a comparison, the below information incorporates the first quarter of years 2015 through 2019 showing what we had received versus what that year's budget was for the first three months.

Thanks to your pledges of financial support we received in December, the Church Council and Financial Oversight Committee developed a budget for faithful ministry at First Congregational for 2019 as approved by our annual meeting in January. As we work through this year of transition, we value your commitment to the Church as your Pledges are necessary to sustain both our Church and Wider Community missions. Council, Stewardship Team and Financial Oversight Committee thank you for your generosity. Background:

Our Immigrant Welcoming Congregation Declaration, adopted unanimously at the January 27 annual meeting, identified four major areas where we will focus our work: Connecting, Educating, Advocating, Accompanying. The action plan will identify specific activities in each of these areas for members to participate in.

Examples:

There are lots of other ways to be involved in Immigrant Welcoming activities. For example, would you like to:

- Assist the Portland First Art Exhibit
 Team on Immigrant Welcoming projects.
 Join the Portland First Immigration
 reading and literacy program.
- 3. Create a Portland First Immigrant Welcoming choral or instrumental music program for adults and/or children.
- 4. Participate with IMIrJ in Accompaniment Training (Immigrant Solidarity Network letter writing, physical accompaniment to ICE checkins and court appointments).
- 5. Participate with IMIrJ in Accompaniment Training for Bilingual/ Bicultural Leaders.
- 6. Attend a Vigil (Bringing elements of

our faith tradition to a public witness/action).

- 7. Assist IMIrJ's Document Translation Team (Help to ensure that documents and information are available in English, Spanish, or other languages).
- 8. Serve on IMIrJ's Clergy Ready Bench (Relational space for clergy to discern, strategize, and rapidly respond).
- 9. Engage in Political Advocacy (Building relationship with local, state, and federal legislators to amplify voices of immigrants and invite them to take courageous action).
- 10. Participate in Denominational Organizing (Building the capacity of our regional and national denomination to advance immigrant justice).
- 11. Attend Organizer Training (Grow in leadership through the art of community organizing) offered by IMIrJ and other community organizations.
- 12. Participate in IMIrJ's Quarterly Gathering Design Team (Help plan meaningful and dynamic gatherings in our church and community).
- 13. Join IMIrJ's Development Team to help grow the financial capacity of IMIrJ.

BEHIND THE DESK OF THE BUSINESS MANAGER By Cara Rothe

The first quarter of the year has been very busy. We have hosted several exciting events such as



Oregon Natural Desert Association, Oregon Symphony, Willamette Writers Association, Hands Off Venezuela, PopMob, Architectural Heritage Center and several regular performances such as Aurora and Kalakendra.

Thanks to our facilities manager, Steve Eggers, we were particularly excited

to partner with a new group called Church of Film. This group has been showing movies at Clinton Street Theater for years, and decided to branch out to a downtown space. On February 14, they screened the movie "A Russian Fairytale." We had a great turnout — with over 200 people — and are already discussing our next movie!

Last summer, NETFLIX filmed part of an episode at the church for their series the OA. You can now see the church's cameo in Season II, episode 3.

We are still searching for our next tenants for the Annex. I met with representatives from the City of Portland, The Red Door Project, Social Justice Funds NW, and a private business owner discussing the renting of our offices. Do Good Multnomah began renting an office in April for their new outreach project. Programs involved will include a Rapid-Rehousing and Communications Department. The

space will be utilized primarily for administrative purposes and a few appointment-only client meetings. Rent for Do Good will be covered by funds raised through events hosted at our church by Steve Eggers and myself in 2017 and 2018. We raised a total of \$16,400 for Do Good Multnomah. Although our hope was to open another shelter, we are happy to be able to support their work in any way that we can!

We have many ongoing projects on the building right now. We are repairing several windows, working on getting our kitchen certified, and switching our sanctuary lights to LED.

I have attended several meetings with Portland 5's Facilities Manager, Operations Manager, and City Project Manager regarding work to be done on their building through the spring and summer of this year. This work will start in May and will have an impact on the sidewalk and on the Madison parking.

Over the past year, I have met several times with Edward Eggleston and Scott Sorenson to prepare for this year's lease negotiation with the city. Our last meeting was in the first week of April and included Ted Heid and Rev. Janet Parker.

Unreinforced Masonry Investigation Project continues. I have been working with other churches and Jim Sikkel for over a year to better understand our place in relation to the new seismic requirements of the city. Jim has done the heavy lifting with this research by using his connections and resources to secure more information. Please let me know if you have any questions about this.

himself non-denominational and has attended a number of different churches, including New Beginnings, since he was 17.




Lenten Reflections: A Time for Meaningful Reflection & Meditation




Discuss Gifts of the Dark Wood with Rev. Janet Parker

TOPIC FOR APRIL 25: DID JESUS RISE IN BODILY FORM, AND DOES IT MATTER FOR YOUR FAITH?

Jesus' resurrection from the dead was the lived experience of the earliest Christians, according to accounts written within a generation of the event. Gospel writers take pains to record experiences of Jesus that demonstrated some characteristics of physical bodies. The Bible and later Creeds of the Church insist that Jesus was not a ghost. Yet minds shaped by modern science struggle to believe this ancient Christian testimony for understandable reasons. Increasingly, many Christians put little to no emphasis on Jesus' bodily resurrection as a nonnegotiable tenet of faith. Many Christians have come to understand Jesus' resurrection as spiritual or metaphorical in nature, or both. Does it matter for your faith whether or not Jesus rose bodily? If so, why? If not, why not?
